Demographic Profile

The population in Miller County, Arkansas was 42,588 per American Community Survey data for 2019-2023.

The region has a civilian labor force of 17,819 with a participation rate of 52.7%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in Miller County, Arkansas, 14.2% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 36.5% in the nation.

The median household income in Miller County, Arkansas is \$49,983 and the median house value is \$148,200.



Employment Trends


As of 2025Q3, total employment for Miller County, Arkansas was 13,540 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2025Q3, employment declined 0.5% in the region.

Unemployment Rate

The unemployment rate for Miller County, Arkansas was 5.0% as of November 2025. The regional unemployment rate was higher than the national rate of 4.3%. One year earlier, in November 2024, the unemployment rate in Miller County, Arkansas was 3.9%.



Wage Trends

The average worker in Miller County, Arkansas earned annual wages of \$50,352 as of 2025Q3. Average annual wages per worker increased 3.7% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$75,653 in the nation as of 2025Q3.

Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 8.4% lower in Miller County, Arkansas than the U.S. average.



Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in Miller County, Arkansas is Manufacturing, employing 2,426 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Health Care and Social Assistance (1,615 workers) and Retail Trade (1,349). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Mining, Quarrying, and Oil and Gas Extraction (LQ = 2.42), Manufacturing (2.31), and Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing and Hunting (1.54).

Sectors in Miller County, Arkansas with the highest average wages per worker are Management of Companies and Enterprises (\$123,985), Utilities (\$100,764), and Information (\$80,769). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 5 years are Manufacturing (+206 jobs), Health Care and Social Assistance (+196), and Wholesale Trade (+119).

Over the next 5 years, employment in Miller County, Arkansas is projected to contract by 300 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Health Care and Social Assistance with a +0.1% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Health Care and Social Assistance (+9 jobs), Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation (0), and Mining, Quarrying, and Oil and Gas Extraction (0).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in Miller County, Arkansas is Production Occupations, employing 1,838 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (1,593 workers) and Office and Administrative Support Occupations (1,233). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Production Occupations (LQ = 2.55), Installation, Maintenance, and Repair Occupations (1.45), and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (1.38).

Occupation groups in Miller County, Arkansas with the highest average wages per worker are Management Occupations (\$99,400), Legal Occupations (\$98,900), and Computer and Mathematical Occupations (\$90,000). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from 1.1% among Legal Occupations to 7.1% among Farming, Fishing, and Forestry Occupations.

Over the next 5 years, the fastest growing occupation group in Miller County, Arkansas is expected to be Healthcare Support Occupations with a +0.3% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Healthcare Support Occupations (+8 jobs) and Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations (+3). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (992 jobs) and Production Occupations (942).



Occupation employment data are estimated via industry employment data and the estimated industry/occupation mix. Industry employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and currently updated through 2025Q2, imputed where necessary with preliminary estimates updated to 2025Q3. Wages by occupation are as of 2025 provided by the BLS and imputed where necessary. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.

Industry Clusters

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. The industry cluster in Miller County, Arkansas with the highest relative concentration is Chemical with a location quotient of 14.40. This cluster employs 1,685 workers in the region with an average wage of \$75,686. Employment in the Chemical cluster is projected to contract in the region about 0.5% per year over the next ten years.

Industry Clusters for Miller County, Arkansas as of 2025Q3



Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in Miller County, Arkansas is projected to contract 0.4% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to contract 0.1% per year, those requiring a bachelor’s degree are forecast to contract 0.3% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to contract 0.3% per year.

Annual Average Projected Job Growth by Education Levels



Gross Domestic Product

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is the total value of goods and services produced by a region. In 2024, nominal GDP in Miller County, Arkansas expanded 4.5%. This follows growth of 2.3% in 2023. As of 2024, total GDP in Miller County, Arkansas was \$1,732,278,000.

Of the sectors in Miller County, Arkansas, Manufacturing contributed the largest portion of GDP in 2024, \$460,195,000. The next-largest contributions came from Real Estate and Rental and Leasing (\$201,070,000); Wholesale Trade (\$132,704,000); and Retail Trade (\$130,786,000).



FAQ

What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the “all industry” level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the “sector,” which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
